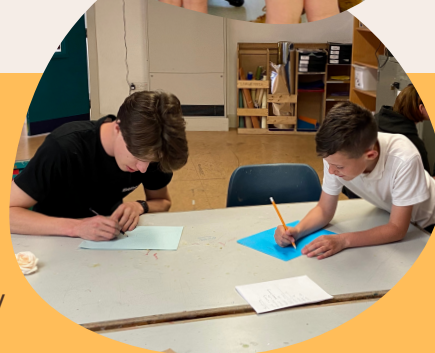
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Nathaniel - Kids Kabin, Newcastle, England Nurturing Kids' Growth Through Encouragement

Working with children (these past 6 months) can sometimes pose challenges due to their limited attention span and lack of motivation. Their fragile personalities can be hindered by the fear of failure and the ongoing process of self-discovery. As adults, it is important to exercise patience and provide encouragement to help them overcome these hurdles. It is crucial to acknowledge that children may not always respond to our desires or requests, but by offering praise and avoiding repetitive tasks that they are comfortable with, we can effectively inspire them to engage in positive activities and explore new experiences.

Just like adults, children seek validation and continuous love. However, providing these can be demanding at times. It requires us to consistently demonstrate adulation and affection towards them, even when faced with challenges. By fostering an environment of support and encouragement, we can create a space where children feel empowered to explore their interests and develop their unique personalities. Together through patient guidance and a balance of praise and constructive feedback, we can help children grow and thrive, promoting their overall well-being and success.

Process Over Product

When I first arrived in Newcastle, we were breaking up the roles of what we wanted to take on at Kids Kabin. I volunteered for several different roles, including becoming Kids Kabin's environment champion. At first, I wasn't sure exactly what this role would mean but I was interested in environmental things and thought it couldn't hurt to learn. I quickly found out that this role was very new to Kids Kabin and that I would essentially be helping to develop the tasks for the role. I had never put together tasks like this before and wasn't very sure where to start, but Will told me to just talk to the staff and see what they think could be improved around the building that would help lower our heating and water numbers as well as conserve our resources.

I was working towards the goal of earning our bronze certification for all the staff at Kids Kabin, for the kids we work with, and for our planet that we all share.

I worked hard for weeks putting together a list of tasks and talking with the staff about what jobs they had the capacity to help with. We started checking things off of our list and felt confident in our accomplishments. Will then asked me if I would be interested in training with Smart Carbon and Investing In the Environment (IIE) to work towards lowering our carbon footprint. Of course, I said yes because it was an amazing learning opportunity, and it could be a wonderful tool for Kids Kabin to teach younger generations to care for our environment. I did the online training, read all the materials, analyzed all of the water, electricity, gas, travel, and waste numbers, and spent countless hours putting them into our carbon calculator. There were days when I was exhausted from looking at spreadsheets and numbers for hours on end and I felt almost stuck in a cycle that led to exhaustion, but I didn't give up.

There was even a point where Will and I took a scale outside and measured our waste and recycling amount to get an accurate number for our waste and recycling numbers. I worked tirelessly towards a goal not only for myself but something much bigger than I. I was working towards the goal of earning our bronze certification for all the staff at Kids Kabin, for the kids we work with, and for the planet that we all share.

In the moments when I was exhausted from working on filling out environment numbers or when I felt frustrated because I got stuck on something, I would stop and think of a quote I love by St Marie Eugenie, "Love never says I have done enough". That quote alone is such a huge part of the mission here at Kids Kabin. This mission year has given me a hunger for wanting to give more and more. Before this year I thought of myself as a fairly giving person. I thought that I lived simply but through this year's challenges, I have seen what simple living and giving selflessly truly is. Even on the nights I would stay late to work, help others on the team or volunteer for extra things, I never felt as though I was doing enough. I felt satisfied with the work I was doing but I wanted a lasting effect. I wanted something I could leave behind that would continue to help. That is such a huge reason that I worked tirelessly towards achieving our bronze certificate. Even though I could never pay back all that Kids Kabin has done for me and taught me, I hope that it will continue to serve the goal and mission that I've been working so hard towards.
